What image fills your mind when you hear the word poverty? Is it somebody begging at the street corner, or a homeless individual pushing a grocery cart down the sidewalk? We encounter people like that every day.

But there are other poor individuals who don't get seen in public. As a result, they often fall through the cracks and lose total control of their lives.

Wealthy people have options of every kind. They can purchase what they want, travel where they desire and do whatever they choose. Extremely poor people have very limited options.


They can apply for food stamps and other forms of public welfare.

Those caught in the middle – often called the working poor – have no options at all. They earn just enough to disqualify them from government aid, but not enough to care for their family's needs. A disproportionately large number of these individuals are women and children. That's what poverty looks like in Southern California, and as people of faith, we must do something.

From 2009 – 2013, the percentage of California single mother households living below the poverty level increased from 25% to 29%. For single mothers with children under 18 years, the numbers went from 34% to 39%. Single moms with children under 5 years came out even worse: from 36% to 41%. The trend continues each year.

Lutheran Social Services encounters 15,000 different families every year. They come to LSS because they know we will help them with food, clothes (see investment option below Emergency Provisions), and also listen to their stories – all of which will be offered with patience and genuine compassion.

A Family Reunited
Carla's life had consisted of one disaster after another. She grew up in foster care,

arla's lite had consisted of one disaster after another. She grew up in foster care, and struggled with mental health issues beginning in early childhood. By the time she was 35, she had four children between the ages of 4 and 10, all of who had special mental health needs. She couldn't find a job, and if she had, there was no

one who could assist her with the children.

She met with a counselor (see investment option on other side Counseling) from Lutheran Social Services. Our staff member listened to her as a trained therapist, but also as a mother. Carla worked with the LSS behavioral staff for 3 ½ years. The process was slow, and often painful, but she persisted. So did LSS.

Eventually, Carla found part-time employment, the children were in school and the entire family started moving out of a world filled with chaos to a life punctuated with order, meaning and hope.
